// 22 Vanguard Way

Designed by Dan Shipley, FAIA, this is a 1,600-square-foot study in compact living. The dwelling did not require grading of the land beneath it. Rather, two large steel I-beams rest on six concrete piers sunk into the otherwise undisturbed terrain. This simple design holds built-in history, as framing for the floors and roof is wood reclaimed from a deck built previously for the owners' wedding. All windows are insulated glass panels of varying sizes salvaged from a glass manufacturer's yard. Sealed wood siding and corrugated metal roofs complete the natural exterior finish and are complemented by natural landscaping. With a rooftop designed to collect rainwater for site irrigation, geothermal mechanical systems, super-insulated walls, and recycled materials throughout, the home has been built according to Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED®) standards set by the United States Green Building Council.

// 4633 Cherokee Trail, Bluffview

Long known as one of the most beautiful streets in Texas, this hidden home is a new construction and owned by a couple with an impressive contemporary art collection. Designed by Bodron + Fruit, this 3,400-square-foot home is nestled on a site in the secluded Bluffview neighborhood off Inwood Road. Materials include limestone, wood, and glass, lending a notable connection to the landscape design. The first floor is primarily devoted to an open entertaining and living area, and private family quarters are located upstairs.








// 3110 Oliver Street

A narrow lot in an established nieghborhood close to the thriving Knox-Henderson entertainment area is the site of the three units designed by WKMC Architects, Inc. Each vertically configured space terminates in a loft-like living area on the third floor, with a rooftop deck that offers sweeping views of downtown. The site is anchored by private gardens with planted wooded trellises. Exterior building materials include western red cedar and fiber-reinforced cement panels. One of the three units will be available for viewing.

// 45 Vanguard Way

Architecture media around the country have paid close attention to the innovative Urban Reserve neighborhood built just north of the Lake Highlands residential area on the near east side of Dallas. Two homes will be open this year on this award-winning, master planned street tucked along White Rock Trail. Architect Vincent Snyder has designed the ultimate green house that uses geothermal energy for heating and cooling, rooftop rainwater collection for site irrigation, and passive cooling and shading accomplished by porches and discrete positioning of glass to divert direct sunlight. This 3,900-square-foot home features a first floor that can be used as one continuous entertaining space. Exposed wood framing and great expanses of glass characterize the interior, while the exterior is defined by wood-siding walls and a complex roofline covered in green slate.
